It is a real treat to have Harold Greer as our speaker this month. Harold is a true expert in all fields regarding rhododendrons and azaleas. He is the author of one of the most famous reference books, Greer's Guidebook to Available Rhododendrons. This excellent book is considered by many to be the bible for information about both species and hybrid rhododendrons. He has also contributed to many other publications by both writing and providing photos of rhododendrons for other authors. Harold is well known for being an excellent photographer and for developing one of the most extensive collections of photographs in existence. Along with his wife, Nancy, they own and operate Greer Gardens in Eugene. This is one of the leading and most well known mail order companies in the country and is recognized world wide as *the* place to find rhododendrons.

Harold received the coveted Gold Medal award from the American Rhododendron Society and served the Society as its International President. Among his many accomplishments, he has been a leader for many years in organizing Western Regional Conferences, as well as ARS conferences. If you have ever registered for a Conference on the West Coast, it is probable that you registered on an insert that Harold designed and wrote. He has devoted much of his life to serving the ARS in many different functions.

Harold will be speaking about ***Rhododendron Diversity***. From the tiny alpine varieties to tree rhododendrons, hardy to tropical, lepidote to elepidote, oldest to newest, Harold will give us a real insight into this extremely diverse genus.

Come join us in learning something new from this most outstanding speaker. He is one of the true giants in the rhododendron world. His book will be available and this may be your opportunity to have yours autographed.

April 19th's meeting also features our Annual Meeting when we nominate new board members and officers.

March 15, 2012 Meeting Re-Cap

We had the pleasure of hearing Steve Hootman speak about his seed collecting expedition in the autumn of 2010 to the provinces of Chongqing, Guizhou and Guangxi in southwestern China. Steve is the Executive Director of the Rhododendron Species Foundation and the Curator of the Rhododendron Species Botanical Garden. The goal of the Foundation and the Garden is to preserve the diversity of the genus in a world class garden. That goal is being met through the efforts of Steve and the staff at the Botanical Garden and through the important expeditions that Steve makes into Asia.

Steve's photography captured the fantastic land forms of southwestern China so well that we could experience the terrain in which the rhododendron species grew. The karst formations with fairly unexplored forests on their tops were fascinating. Every direction that you looked, there were steep mountains where the rhododendrons grew. Now, that's how you get good drainage! Among the species that Steve found are *R. platypodum*; *R. wumingense*; *R. changii* and *R. rubiginosum* aff., to name only a few. Other genera of trees and shrubs, ferns and gesneriads were not ignored and are in the process of being identified also. To see more information about Steve's expeditions, go to www.rhodygarden.org.

After the program, we auctioned a great collection of companion plants with some rhododendrons finding their way into the excitement of the bidding, also. Steve brought a fine array of species to be auctioned and we are very grateful for the donation of those plants from the RSBG.

A Cheerful Dwarf: Rhododendron 'Peter Bee'

Imagine that a dwarf rhododendron grows so compactly that, after 33 years of growing, it measures only three feet high by three feet wide. Now picture bright yellow flowers completely covering this mounding rhododendron. 'Peter Bee' is a treasure to have in your garden. Thank you, Warren Berg, for hybridizing (1967), growing, naming (with Peter Cox's help), and registering (2001) this fine dwarf rhododendron. Of further historical interest is the fact that 'Peter Bee' was introduced by its namesake, Peter Cox, at Glendoick Gardens in Scotland. Here are some additional details to ponder: It is a lepidote; the parents are *R. hanceanum* Nanum Group (Cox form) X *R. keiskei* 'Yaku Fairy'; its flowers are a vibrant yellow with a touch of green that does not take away from the brightness of the yellow; the leaves are a medium green and elliptic in shape with widely spaced scales on the undersides of the leaves; it blooms in late April into early May; depending on its placement, 'Peter Bee' should grow to about 1 1/2 feet tall by 2 feet wide in about ten years.

Here are two more dates to add to this year's calendar of delights:

Saturday, May 12

Wednesday, May 16

Starting time will be 10:00 AM on both days. The Hinsdale Garden is next to the Umpqua River, about 5 miles east of Reedsport on Highway 38.

May 12 will be this year's Public Open Garden Day, and includes a special invitation to ARS members to act as docents and ambassadors for the garden and rhododendrons - a primary goal we share. A definite plus is the opportunity to do so in a garden created during the early years of the ARS.

Visitors on the 12th will check in at the kiosk and information center for the elk viewing area west of the garden. BLM will provide shuttle service from there to and from the garden. Though the entire garden is not available to persons with disabilities, they will find much of the main garden, along with excellent perspectives of large plants in the east garden, quite visible from the driveway circling in front of the house.

Several other events clamor for gardeners' attention on the weekend, so we have arranged time the following Wednesday especially for garden enthusiasts. This date is for ARS members, their gardening friends and members of other garden groups. Folks of limited mobility may be left off at the main entrance, and parking will be in the small lot immediately east of the garden. Car-pooling is encouraged because of limited parking space.

It simply doesn't get any better than a coastal drive highlighting nature's annual renewal, coupled with your destination at a mature woodland garden on the banks of the scenic Umpqua River.

Wildlife: Crystal Springs is a birder's paradise. From black and yellow Townsend's Warblers working the flower spikes on Mahonia japonica in February, to Golden-Crowned Kinglets and Ruby-Crowned Kinglets investigating the moss and lichens on deciduous shrubs and Red-Winged Blackbirds staking out the low bridge in March, to Violet-Green Swallows skimming the lake this past week and hummingbirds working the red-flowering currant and clumps of blooming Pulmonaria, there's always something new to discover. Interestingly, the Wood Ducks at Crystal Springs are a major success story for the garden and internationally famous among birders and photographers.

Admission to the garden is free to Rhododendron Society members, and admission for the general public is free Tuesdays and Wednesdays and all week before 10:00AM and after 6:00PM. Other times, \$3.00 per person.
