### Directions:

#### *From Portland:*

Take I-5 south to Exit 278 ( Donald exit )

Go west (right) at exit onto Ehlen Rd. for 7 miles to end of road at Hwy 219. Turn right onto Hwy 219 for 3/4 mile and look for blue Heirloom Roses sign. Follow Heirloom Roses sign going left onto Champoeg Rd.

Go straight onto Raybell Rd. at dairy barn where Champoeg Rd. turns right. Smith Garden is at 5055 Raybell Rd. NE, about 1/3 mile on right.

Parking and entrance are just past the house with the Garden address.

#### *From 99W:*

Go south or north on 99w to Newberg.

Turn south onto Hwy 219 jus north of downtown Newberg.

Go south for 3 miles to the Willamette River bridge; at less than 1/2 mile past the river, look for the blue Heirloom Roses sign.

Follow Heirloom Roses sign right onto Champoeg Rd; go straight onto Raybell Rd. where Champoeg Rd. turns right. Garden is at 5055 Raybell Rd. NE, about 1/2 mile on right. Parking and entrance are just past the house.

## Smith Garden

The Smith Garden is a woodland garden. It manifests Cecil Smith's love of the Oregon woodlands and their native plants. Cecil and Molly Smith started collecting rhododendrons in the 1940's at their old house which was adjacent to the wooded property they obtained in 1951. Cecil was an early member of the American Rhododendron Society (1947) for several years before they owned the property.

Many plants in the Garden collection are now over 70 years old. Some that have attained that distinction are the magnificent R. 'Loderi King George' and R. 'Loderi Pink Diamond'. Cecil pruned these large-growing plants into their present tree-like forms. The Garden is on an ideal, north-facing hillside and has adequate water resources, which benefits the rhododendrons and companion plants.

Cecil subscribed to several seed-collecting expeditions and the garden contains some species grown from that seed. Look for fine or unusual species including R. davidsonianum 'Ruth Lyons'; R. crinigerum; R. rude; R. proteoides; R. trailianum and many others. In addition, there are many Cecil Smith hybrids, such as R. 'Noyo Brave', R. 'Noyo Warrior', R. 'Cecil's Goal' and R. 'Yellow Saucer'. Cecil was among the first to grow R. yakushmanum and R. bureavii and to use them in his hybridizing. By combining those two species, he produced R. 'Cinnamon Bear', the signature plant of the garden.

Molly and Cecil freely shared their garden and hosted many garden tours. No one interested in rhododendrons was denied a visit to their garden. In 1983, after more than thirty years of devoted stewardship, Cecil and Molly reached a point in their lives where they could no longer care for the garden. The Portland Chapter of the ARS was able to purchase the property, and, along with the help of the Willamette and Tualatin Valley Chapters, assumed its care and management.

When the Garden was first acquired, some members of the newly-formed Smith Garden Committee felt it should be preserved as it was when Cecil and Molly left it. Gardens do not cooperate with that ideal. Plants grow too large and become too crowded. Weather disasters have significantly altered the site. To better accommodate crowding in the garden, several new beds have been created and a semi-automated watering system installed.

Complementing the rhododendron collection are choice trees, shrubs, wildflowers and bulbs. Each pathway reveals its own treasure through the seasons: a moss-covered log with plants tucked into bark crevices, a fern garden, and drifts of cyclamen, narcissus, erythronium and trillium. The Smith Garden is truly a botanical treasure.

## **Outstanding Flowers and Amazing Foliage: R. ‘Cherries and Merlot’**

When you see this hybrid by Frank Fujioka for the first time, the colorful undersides of the leaves attract your attention so much that you forget to ask about the flowers. When you hear that the flowers are a deep, bright red, the combination sounds intriguing. In fact, the flowers are so rich in color that they meld well with the foliage to form a truly superb new hybrid.

Here is more about R. ‘Cherries and Merlot’:

It is an elepidote. It has no scales on its leaves.

The cross: (‘Pretty Baby’ x R. pachysanthum) X ‘Whid Bee’

The red flowers come from these parents in this cross: ‘Cornubia’, ‘Noyo Chief’, ‘Kilimanjaro’ ‘Rubicon’ and ‘Rosevallon’. The red-purple undersides of the leaves come from ‘Rosevallon’.

Flowers: The trusses are rounded and are constructed of deep, bright red corollas that are funnel-campanulate in shape. The bloom time is early April.

Leaves: Dark green on top, and red-purple on the undersides.

Height: 3 feet in 10 years

Hardiness: Unknown at this time. Two of the parents, R. pachysanthum and R. yakushmanum, may lend some hardiness to the cross.

Placement in your garden: Protect it from the cold until you know its hardiness. Some shade is desirable.
