## The 2014 Royal Horticultural Society's Chelsea Flower Show

The Portland Chapter of the American Rhododendron Society will hold our March meeting on Thursday, March 19, 2015, from 7:00 to 9:00 pm at All Saints Episcopal Church, 4033 SE Woodstock Blvd., Portland, Oregon.

Our featured speaker will be Bud Bowen. Bud has been co-owner of Ainsworth House and Garden in Oregon City for 10 years. Ainsworth House is an historic property, built in 1851. It is surrounded by two acres of lush gardens and hosts weddings and many other types of gatherings and events.

Last summer, Bud traveled to the U.K., where he attended the 2014 Royal Horticultural Society's Chelsea Flower Show and took approximately 1000 photographs. He has selected the best of those photos and will be showing them to us at our March. It promises to be a sight to behold!

## First Annual Rhododendron Tour on the Long Beach Peninsula, May 2nd, 2015

You're invited to a first annual Rhododendron Tour on the Long Beach Peninsula, Saturday, May 2nd. Included among the properties on the tour will be the former Clarke Nursery, founded by former ARS Gold Medal Winner and past President, Dr. J. You'll see many historic species and hybrid rhododendrons along with newer specimens displayed in handsome residential garden settings. The day will be highlighted by an optional breakfast to be held at the historic Shelburne Inn in Seaview, featuring a talk by Dr. Clarke's grandson, Steve Clarke, owner of the continuing Clarke Nursery landscape business. The event is produced by the Water Music Festival, which benefits music education in the Ocean Beach school district.

## **The Importance of Volunteers**

My membership in the American Rhododendron Society dates back almost forty-five years. One of the most impressive things about the Society then was that it was based primarily on volunteers; people spent hours of their time and resources working for the benefit of the Society and its members. Today we face a steady decline in our membership, which has led to financial difficulties, as well as a decline in participation. I am concerned that our membership may continue to decline at least in the near term, leading us to become a small Society with a few dedicated people. That requires more of our members to volunteer to support all the responsibilities we have assumed. That translates to more attendance at garden work parties, more members eager to accept officers positions and more. Let's make all our events attract big crowds! Educational outreach and volunteerism is the way to increase our growth and guarantee our survival.

## **Highlights of the February Meeting**

At our February meeting, we welcomed a full house of members and guests who were eager to hear Russell Graham speak about trilliums. He is an expert on the genus *Trillium* and it was fascinating to learn that there are so many species in the genus. They grow across the temperate regions of North America and Asia. The white, yellow, purple or red flowers are either supported on a short stalk above the leaves (pedicellate) or grown directly on top of the leaves (sessile). Russell included his thoughts about propagation by seed, suggesting that we leave our special trilliums in place to seed around and grow their own seedlings, instead of collecting the seeds and trying to germinate them in a different medium. Russell's talk reminded us that trilliums are wonderful companion plants for rhododendrons.

Thank you to the members who treated us to the ever-popular "Sweets for Sweet" potluck. The table was laden with goodies to tempt us to indulge.

And that brings us to the companion plant auction, which was ably run by Dick Cavender and his helping hands, Karen Cavender, Dave Collier and Dennis O'Malley. The bidding was spirited and the crew auctioned off a nice variety of plants brought in by our members.

## Rhododendron 'Calfort': Gorgeous Leaves Crowned By Impressive Flowers

During our trip to New Zealand in October, 2014, we experienced the pleasure of visiting many fine gardens. We soon found rhododendrons in these gardens that we also grow in the Pacific Northwest. It was fun to see that we shared a common interest with people living over 7,000 miles away from Oregon and in another hemisphere. One of the rhododendrons catching our eye was R. 'Calfort'. It quite easy to see both parents in this beautiful hybrid. They are R. calophytum and R. fortunei. It may not be easy to find this rhododendron in the Pacific Northwest, however, finding it may lead you on an adventure!

Here is more about R. 'Calfort':

Parentage: R. calophytum (seed parent) x R. fortunei (pollen parent). Described as being part of the Calfort Group

Hybridizer: L. France, circa 1921

Leaves: Lanceolate in shape, medium green, similar in length to R. calophytum

Flowers: slightly scented; white with red blotch; blooms April to May

Height: about 12 feet in 10 years

Hardiness: 0 degrees F.

Placement: partial shade  
will be of benefit to this rhododendron.

We are NOT charging an entrance fee into Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden that Saturday or Sunday. Our goals are for the public to be "invited" and also to sell plants and have a successful truss show.
