March Meeting

The Portland Chapter of the American Rhododendron Society will hold its March meeting on Thursday, March 15, 2018 from 7:00 pm - 9:00 pm.

Our March meeting will feature John Weagle of Halifax, Nova Scotia and the Atlantic Rhododendron and Horticultural Society, speaking on "175 Years of Rhododendrons in Nova Scotia." This should be a special presentation that you will not want to miss.

Our speaker for the March meeting has been gardening in Halifax, Nova Scotia since childhood. Nova Scotia, or Acadia as it was then known, was first settled by the French in 1605. For 150 years, the Acadians developed the rich interior farmlands, reclaiming tidal land by an ingenious system of dikes, much of which remains functional to this day. In 1748, the Treaty of Aix-La-Chapelle ceded Acadia to the English. Coastal Nova Scotia. With its cool, foggy summers, is a surprising haven for rhododendrons. Once established, they require little maintenance and no irrigation. He will trace the early quest of the native Rhododendron maximum and cultivation of ironclads from 1850 onward. The climate of Nova Scotia, but primarily the work of pioneer rhododendron hybridizers from 1950 to the present, will be his focus, with a glimpse of what the future might have in store.

John Weagle worked for nearly 30 years as a buyer for horticultural companies in B.C. and Halifax. His big advance as a gardener came when he decided to ignore all the books that painted a grim picture of horticulture on the wind-swept, fog-bound coast of Nova Scotia. In the early 1970's, good friends introduced him to hybridizing rhododendrons and azaleas, which he has been breeding since the late 1970's. His interests extend generally to the Family Ericaceae, which does well in coastal Nova Scotia, and specifically ranging from bamboos to Shortia. With the help of his skilled partner Ken Shannik, who operates Insigne Gardens, they maintain two city gardens, a woodland garden 60 miles from the city, and a new garden they are starting in a mild area on an island near Yarmouth. He owes their vast collection of plants, hardy and tender, to the generosity of his many contacts worldwide. Now retired, he is a well-recognized plantsman and source of insightful information, such as "(T. camtschaticum) is more difficult to spell than it is to grow." He is a recipient of the Leslie Hancock Award and The Hybridizer's Award of the Rhododendron

February Meeting Report:

A cold and dark evening was warmed by Loren Russell's talk on Oregon's own *Kalmiopsis*, first discovered in what is now known as the Kalmiopsis Wilderness in the southwest corner of our state. Loren is a retired entomologist but by no means is he inactive. His expertise extends beyond Kalmiopsis to terrestrial orchids and competitive bicycling. Fortunately, Loren chose to drive rather than to cycle to the meeting from his home in Corvallis on that freezing night in February.

He entertained us with the discovery of Kalmiopsis in 1930 when Lilla and John Leach and their two burros, Pansy and Viola set forth on the primitive trails in this region of the Siskiyou. We also found out that Kalmiopsis is related to rhododendrons and Kalmia, but has even more closely related counterparts in the inhospitable regions of the northern hemisphere. Kalmiopsis thrive on harsh serpentine soils high in iron and magnesium and are also able to repopulate fire-ravaged areas and thus don't have many competitors.

Three Magnificent and Early Blooming Species: *R. calophytum*, *R. praeevernum* and *R. sutchuenense* var. *geraldii*

During those two weeks of cold and snowy weather in late February, one of the rhododendrons in our garden continued to swell its buds and to look as if Spring was approaching. The cold weather does not faze our hardy *R. sutchuenense* var. *geraldii* and you can count on *R. calophytum* and *R. praeevernum* to be just as hardy. Keep in mind, however, that all three species will prefer being sheltered from strong winds that might break the leaf petioles of their attractive long leaves. All three will command rather large spaces with *R. praeevernum* growing somewhat smaller and more slowly than the other two. Adding to their grand stature are their early and large flowers, prominently displayed on the tips of their strong branches.

Here is more about each of these species which are all members of Subgenus *Hymenanthes*; Section *Hymenanthes*; Subsection *Fortunea*:

R. calophytum var. *calophytum* is the most cultivated of the *R. calophytum* varieties. (As a side note, variety *R. openshawianum* is considered by some to be an inferior form of *R. calophytum*.) It will eventually become a beautiful tree, showing off its large, light pink flowers, each one displaying a deep red blotch. Considering that *R. calophytum*'s medium green leaves can be as long as a foot, you will want to plant it out of strong winds in your garden. When a hint of spring comes, watch for *R. calophytum* buds to swell and bloom as early as February. We have a photo of a *R. calophytum* blooming with snow on the ground. It is hardy to -15 degrees F. You will find it in the wild in Szechwan and NE Yunnan at 6,000 to 13,000 feet in elevation.

R. praeevernum is slower and lower-growing than *R. calophytum* and *R. sutchuenense*. Its lance-shaped leaves are smaller than the other two species, also. You should still place it out of strong winds for the sake of the leaves. Some experts consider *R. praeevernum* to be closely related to *R. sutchuenense*. With its handsome form, it eventually becomes a small tree in a more compact manner than the other two species. And its large white or pink flowers with wine-red blotches, decorate it wonderfully. Blooming as early as February, you will want to site it slightly under a tree to protect its flowers. The leaves, stems and roots, however, are quite hardy, to -5 degrees F. You will find it in the wild in W. Hubei and E. Szechwan at 5,000 to 8,000 feet in elevation.

R. sutchuenense var. *geraldii* seems to be related to *R. praeevernum*. This fine and hardy rhododendron originated from E.H. Wilson seed and he considered it to be "midway" between *R. praeevernum* and *R. sutchuenense*. It grows into a very large shrub with foot-long, medium green, lance-shaped leaves. Each clear pink corolla has a large dark red-purple blotch. The overall effect is spectacular. Blooming as early as February, some frost protection is desirable. Its hardiness is -10 degrees F. You will find it in the wild in Western Hubei and Eastern Szechwan at 5,000 to 8,000 feet in elevation.

The distinguishing feature that separates *R. sutchuenense* from *R. sutchuenense* var. *geraldii* are corollas that have a few red spots *but no blotches*. Also, *R. sutchuenense* has a range of colors from very light pink to mauve pink. Both species are magnificent!
