President's Message

Last dance. This month, I pass the baton of presidency over to the capable hands of **Mike Domaschopfsky**. Mike has been fabulous to work with and will bring a lot of positive energy to the Chapter.

I leave you in great hands, with a very capable President, a superb vice president (**Maria Stewart**), and an outstanding board. I have a few tasks to finish up this summer for the Chapter and Garden, and will continue to help out as I can. **So much to do, so little time.**

Building a new home and garden is quite an adventure. We passed the first county rezoning dance and await the date for our public meeting hearing. Hopefully, we will make a great impression in our 15 minutes of fame and be granted the rezone this summer. It will be the least they can do considering all the driving we will have to do to be there (11+ hours) and the number of scotch broom shrubs we are pulling..

The new house plans are looking great. I've resolved the plumbing running through doorway problems and will be ready to turn over our draft plans to a designer by August. If we pass the rezone test, we will be able to apply for a building variance, put our current house up for sale, and get really serious about the move.

For now, we can dream. We are making the hard decisions now....where to put the house, the barn, the holding bins, vegetable garden, healing garden, big leaf rhodos, fruit trees, etc. We are dreaming about what the garden should look like, where to build pathways, and how to keep the deer at bay. We have walked the property nearly monthly and noted changing conditions. We were looking for wet areas, dry areas, areas with erosion, areas with good grass and weed growth, areas with stunted trees (that might make good bonsai).

We've been digging in the soil for some time, looking to see how deep the layers are, where the soil is missing (due to erosion), and where it forms a thick chocolate cake layer. During this process, we will be capturing our findings electronically with the use of a GPS system. There has been talk about using such a system to capture plant locations and health information for the plant database

at CSRG. The technology is so accessible and easy to use that anyone can use it to document their collection and build an inventory.

We took soil samples earlier this month, and will begin analyzing the soil in more depth. My plan is to also dig and pot up some of those stunted pine trees, clear more gorse and scotch broom, and encourage the cows to eat more blackberries.

At our current home, we will continue painting and cleaning up inside and begin digging and potting plants (iris) outside. This fall the azaleas and rhodos will be dug and we will build protected raised holding beds, and move plants during the winter. We have a lot of plants to move before March rolls around which is when we plan to put the 'old' house up for sale.

In the meantime, I am beginning to like the cows more and more. Somehow they seem cute as they chomp down the blackberries and weeds. Blank but cute. I think I recognize that blank look... as in before coffee most mornings.

And then suddenly it is the last dance. Thank you all for your support and great ideas. May your rhodies bloom like gangbusters, the weeds forget to seed, and your paths always lead to new adventures. **Happy trails to you.**

Our Board meetings are typically interesting and productive discussions, the May meeting was no exception. We talked about how much fun the Awards Banquet was, how successful the CSRG Mother's Day Show and Sale was (and ideas to make it even more successful next year), programs for next year, and activities at the gardens.

The Board also approved partnering with the Daffodil Society at the Early Show. They may have as many as 2,000 blooms which, with our normal early show offerings, will fill the exhibit hall. The show will be extended to two days, which will include a plant sale and daffodil bouquets for sale. It should be an exciting time. Be sure to watch for more details on this event.

The **June board meeting** will be devoted to a review of the website and strategizing what kinds of information needs to be added to help our publics. The focus will primarily be on the Chapter and on Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden pages. Please join the board at **7:30 pm** on **June 22** at the Van Veen Nursery to contribute your ideas or get involved.
