The Legacy of the Kerr Gardens

By all accounts, the Northwestern corner of the United States is recognized as a premier location for those with a horticultural bent of mind. Over the decades of the 20th century, a select number of people have found themselves singularly disposed to take advantage of this inviting set of circumstances. Jane Kerr Platt is certainly to be found among them. The evolution of her particular plot of land in Portland's West Hills into a collection of the choicest assemblage of plants arranged with the highest standard, came as no accident.

Jane was the second daughter of Scotsman, Peter Kerr, a prosperous grain merchant of the last part of the 19th and the first half of the 20th century. Kerr, himself, developed one of the foremost gardens in the Portland area, Elk Rock. Jane's elder sister, Lady Anne McDonald, also had a notable horticultural bent in her own right and produced a remarkable garden near Elk Rock. This garden is presently in the able hands of Susan Bates, who carries on in a most salutary fashion.

Our speaker, Peter Kendall, will show us with wonderful photos and commentary, 'The Legacy of the Kerr Gardens.' Peter is a landscape gardener specializing in ornamental pruning and horticultural design and consultation. He has practiced in the Portland area for some 25 years. Over the last decade or so, he has combined his interest in plants with his love of photography to photograph a number of outstanding public and private gardens in the immediate area. Foremost among these have been the garden of the Bishop's Close at Elk Rock and the Jane Kerr Platt garden. He has photographed these gardens in each season to allow a glimpse of what is integral to well-designed gardens—their ability to delight continuously because of layout and the meticulous selection of exquisite plant material.

Put November 17th on your calendar so you can take a fascinating tour of the gardens of the Kerr family via Peter's beautiful photos.

A Re-cap of our October 20th Meeting

Bill Zanze, assisted by his wife Sarah, gave us an inspiring presentation on the newest garden addition in Washington Park, the *Cloud Forest* rhododendron species garden.

Working with his colleague, Stefan Bump, and a dedicated crew of volunteers, and with the enthusiastic support of his boss, Bill led the charge to reclaim a large area in the northeast corner of Washington Park from invasive plant species, years of accumulated trash and destructive, illegal activity. His dramatic before-and-after photos gave striking visual testimony to the size of the undertaking and the thousands of hours of labor involved. One surprise was the importance of enhancing public safety in the process of clearing the area, allowing all of us to add to the public 'presence' needed to turn around a long-neglected and abused section of the park, not exactly what we might expect in an urban horticulturalist's job description.

Bill and Stefan developed their exciting vision for the newly-reclaimed areas over time, as the underlying land emerged from its cocoon of English ivy, laurel, hawthorne, Himalayan blackberry and other weed species. Since the site is on a hillside, it has been possible to showcase the new rhododendron plantings by constructing paths both above and below those plantings, giving visitors a much better look at the special character of species rhododendrons and their companion plants. Bill gave us a 3-page handout listing all the established rhododendrons and the new species in Washington Park. One point Bill stressed in his talk is the importance of accurate, comprehensive records of all the plants in the new garden, which affected the choice of suppliers for plants.

Following Bill's presentation, we held our annual rhododendron species auction, with our own Dick Cavender in the role of auctioneer. Many rare and unusual plants were available and we grossed \$461.00 this year.

Blueberry Pizza

From: Maria Stewart, by popular demand

Crust: Combine 2 packages of fine graham-cracker crumbs to equal 2 1/2 cups with 1/3 cup sugar and 3/4 cup melted butter or margarine; mix. Press firmly into a 9 1/2" X 13 1/2" (or 9"X13") Pyrex pan. Bake in a moderate oven (375) for 6 to 8 minutes or until edges are browned. Cool.

Topping: Combine 6 tablespoons cornstarch and 3/4 cup sugar. Add to 3 cups of blueberries and 2/3 cup water. Mix and cook until clear and thickened. Cool.

Cream cheese mixture: Cream together 16 oz. cream cheese, 1 teaspoon vanilla and 3/4 cup sugar. Spread this mixture over the cooled, cooked crust.

Spread the blueberry topping over the cream cheese mixture. Keep cool until served.

(Note: I have reduced the sugar in each layer by 1/4 cup from the amounts in the original recipe. This is a doubled recipe. MS)
