Teresia M. Hazen, M.Ed., HTR, QMHP is a former member of the ARS and a Registered Horticultural Therapist and Coordinator of Therapeutic Gardens for Legacy Health, Portland. She will speak on the restorative health benefits of gardens and gardening.

Ms. Hazen writes that she has been with Legacy Health since 1991, when she pioneered the horticultural therapy program and therapeutic gardens for long-term care and skilled nursing patients. Presently, she oversees ten therapeutic gardens and related horticultural therapy work through the Rehabilitation Institute of Oregon, Emanuel Children's Hospital and the Oregon Burn Center. The Good Samaritan Hospital Stenzel Healing Garden was recognized by the American Horticultural Therapy Association Therapeutic Garden Award in 1998. The Children's Hospital Garden received the same honor in 2000 and the Oregon Burn Center Garden in 2006. In addition, Ms. Hazen has herself received numerous awards for her work.

White Smith and Ginny Mapes. The judges were Ron Mapes, Dave Collier, Peter Kendall, Steve Hopkins and Jeff and Debbie Cheyne. Dick Cavender was always available to help in any situation that came up. The tear-down crew consisted of members already mentioned. We had 150 rhododendron entries and 6 trophies were awarded. On April 19th, a group of us visited four gardens that feature rhododendrons. We called it the 'Gardening in the Hills Tour' because all of the gardens are situated on hills. Our first stop was 'The Cloud Forest' in Washington Park, where Bill Zanze gave us wonderful descriptions of the species rhododendrons and companion plants collected there. He told us the history of the painstaking renovation that removed thick ivy and other invasive plants, to reveal a perfect hillside for growing rhododendrons. Next, we traveled to Bovees' Nursery, where E. White and Lucie invited us to walk along their pathways under their beautiful species rhododendrons. Many of them were in bloom. Then into their greenhouses we went to be thrilled by their huge collection of vireyas. Their fascinating flowers of different colors, shapes and sizes made us wonder..."Do I have a place warm enough to grow these?" Our third garden to visit was the Cavenders' garden, where Dick encouraged us to walk through their garden before the rain set in. Their collection of rhododendrons and companion plants is so encompassing that every two steps takes you to the next fascinating plant that you want to learn about. Dick and Karen's collection includes rare trees and shrubs

A New Species Introduction to Appreciate: *Rhododendron huianum*

On April 25-26th, The Rhododendron Species Foundation celebrated its 50th Anniversary in Federal Way, Washington. During the Celebration, Mike and I had the pleasure of walking in the Rhododendron Species Botanical Garden to view the many species and companion plants that have been collected over the last fifty years. One of our favorite species, and there are many to call our favorites, is *Rhododendron huianum*. It was in full bloom at the RSBG when we visited.

Here is more about *R. huianum*:

Classification: Section: *Hymenanthes* Subsection: *Fortunea*. *R. huianum* is separated from its other *Fortunea* relatives by its pointed leaves and its noticeable calyx.

Natural origin: South and Southeast Sichuan, Northeast Yunnan, Northeast Guizhou at 3,250 to 9,000 feet elevation in broad-leaved forests. It was introduced outside of China in 1994-5.

It is an elepidote, meaning that its leaves do not have scales.

Leaves: oblong-lanceolate with pointed tips and somewhat glaucous underneath.

Flowers: usually deep rose to purple with nectar pouches, Each corolla has a distinctive calyx that decorates it like the “cap” of an acorn with its 7 rounded lobes. There are about 6 to 12 corollas in a loose truss that shows off the calyx on each one. Blooms in April.

Height and structure: 6 to 9 feet in 10 years and grows into a small tree or large shrub.

Hardiness: 0 degrees F. ?



Symptoms, Facts & Suggested Treatments for Recognizing & Treating Lace Bugs

SYMPTOMS / DAMAGE

Indicators are white or yellow dots on top of the leaf. Black or brown spots, and the insects themselves, may be seen on the bottom. In severe cases the leaves appear almost entirely white.

LIFE CYCLE



Eggs are laid along the central rib of a leaf. They typically begin hatching in early-mid May and hatch over a long period of time.

Nymphs are the next stage. **This is generally the most effective time for treatment.**

Adults cause 12 times the damage of the nymphs.

MANAGEMENT / TREATMENT

****URGENT**** Begin treatment as soon as you see nymphs. They can be found on the underside of leaves. Nymphs are up to 1/8" long & are translucent with bits of yellow/green. *Treatment after you see damage will not remove the damage.*

Chemical-free Options:

*Use a strong stream of water to knock the nymphs off the plants. Focus the water on the underside of the leaves. Do this weekly when there are nymphs.

Biologicals:

Utilize Green Lacewings to effectively control lace bugs. Green Lacewings can be purchased.

Insecticides:

*Insecticides will help control lace bugs; however, they may also harm beneficial insects and bees.

****Apply ONLY to non-blooming plants.** Apply early morning or evening when bees are not present.

Spray nymphs and adults with horticultural oil or insecticidal soap on the undersides of leaves.

Systemics:

Often labeled for insect control on roses. Lace bugs are among the insects controlled. This will work on Rhododendrons & Azaleas. Apply at flower drop. They are considered very safe provided they are used correctly. They are widely regarded as the best control. If used as a soil drench, you do not have to worry about damage to bees or other insects. The most common is imidacloprid.
